

- In verse 13 of our text, the phrase "reaching forth" literally means "to stretch oneself forward."
- According to God's Word, we need to be reaching forth and stretching ourselves spiritually in our Christian walk and as a church family.
- How can we (individually and as a church) stretch ourselves spiritually? This text will show us how.

First, we must refuse to trust in our <u>fleshly</u> power. vs. 3

Second, our passion must be for a <u>Person</u> – Jesus Christ, vs. 10

Third, _____ from the past, but don't live in it. – vs. 13

- We will never know Christ in a greater way we will never be stretched spiritually - until we decide to forget those things which are behind.
- You cannot know someone in the _____ if your heart is dwelling on the past.
- Knowing Christ does not change the past, but it changes the _____ of the past.

•	"Forgetting" doesn't mean it is wiped from your memory. Biblically, it means that we are no longer influenced or affected by those things in a way.
•	Too many Christians live in bondage to the past. They live with regrets, guilt, or bitterness over past events. This impedes their ability to and be stretched.
•	You can live in the past and continue to dig up bad memories and painful events if you want to, but you need to understand two facts about this:
	\Rightarrow First, it will do nothing to the past.
	⇒ Second, it will hinder you in Christ in the present and growing spiritually.
Fourth, we must rise above our – vs. 17-19	
•	Paul was determined to reach forth and press forward, but Paul had enemies.
•	They are not team players. They are "" players. They want to shackle you to the past, and they will suck the life right out of you.
