Galatians Chapter 6

Verse 6

- 1. When we are walking in the Spirit, what is another way that it is visibly demonstrated? A thankful, giving heart.
- 2. This verse is teaching that when we are taught spiritual truth ("good things" Romans 10:15), we should respond with a gracious, giving heart.
 - The word "communicate" means "to share with others."
 - Several times in Paul's epistles, this word is used to describe the giving and sharing of our material resources and money. Romans 12:13; Philippians 4:15; 1 Timothy 6:17-18
- 3. If we are taught in the Word, we have a responsibility to meet the material needs of the church and its leaders (the channel whereby we receive the Word).

 1 Timothy 5:17-18; Romans 15:27; 1 Corinthians 9:13-14
- 4. When we give of our blessings to meet the material needs of our local church, this is simply a reflection of our love and appreciation for the spiritual truth that we have been taught.
 - **Illustration:** We shouldn't have an attitude of resentment towards giving our money any more than when the waiter leaves a check at the end of our meal at a restaurant. We expect it good food costs something.
- 5. Our giving is truly a reflection of how much we value the spiritual truth we are taught.

Verse 7

- 1. Paul says, "Be not deceived..."
 - The word "deceived" means "to be led astray," and is also translated "to err" in many other places.
 - According to Mark 12:24, we are led astray when we are ignorant of God's Word and God's power.
- 2. When we think we can mock God and show Him a liar, we are the ones deceived. Paul is saying, "You will not make a fool out of God."
- 3. "For whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap."
 - Very simply put, what you plant, you will harvest.
- 4. Keep in mind that this is written in the context of giving. Paul taught this same principle in 2 Corinthians 9:6.
 - This doesn't mean that if you give a hundred dollars you will reap a hundred dollars.
 - For many of the seeds we have sown, the harvest will not be reaped until eternity. But guaranteed, God's law of sowing and reaping **will** take place. 2 Corinthians 4:17-18
- 5. When we give with a right heart, it abounds to our account in heaven. Philippians 4:17

• This is a guarantee backed up by something more reliable than the U.S. Department of the Treasury. It is backed up by God Almighty!

Verse 8

- 1. Verses 7 and 8 are somewhat parenthetical. Paul continues the analogy of sowing and reaping, but broadens its application beyond giving.
- 2. Here is the principle simply put:
 - Sowing to the flesh brings the crop of corruption.
 - Sowing to the Spirit yields a harvest of life.
- 3. When a believer makes a decision to sow to his flesh, only death, decay, and corruption can result. The results of sowing to the flesh were seen in Galatians 5:19-21.
 - It is a simple law of sowing of reaping. You can only harvest what you plant.
 - If in the flesh dwells "no good thing" (Romans 7:18), when you choose to sow to the flesh, what is the only possible harvest? "No good thing" (corruption).
 - You cannot plant apple seeds and expect to get oranges. You cannot sow to the flesh and expect to get the fruit of Galatians 5:22 & 23.
- 4. On the other hand, when you choose to sow to the Spirit, you can expect a living, eternal crop.
- 5. When we choose to walk in the Spirit, we still abide physically in these fleshly bodies, but the life of Christ is manifest through them. Galatians 2:20; 2 Corinthians 4:10-11
- 6. The Christian does not have to sow to the flesh. Romans 8:2 declares that "the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus hath made me free from the law of sin and death."
 - The new law of the Spirit of life supersedes the old fleshly law of sin and death.
- 7. The Christian can choose to sow to the flesh or the Spirit, but the consequences are clear and will never change. Romans 8:5-6, 12-13

Verse 9

- 1. As we sow to the Spirit, we can get **weary** in well doing. 2 Thessalonians 3:13
 - Paul is not saying that it is wrong to get physically weary, because Jesus himself experienced this. John 4:6
 - The word "weary" speaks of failing in heart and spirit.
- 2. Why do we become weary and discouraged in heart? Because we do not always see immediate and positive results. In fact, we may see the opposite. 1 Peter 3:17
 - When a farmer plants seed, he has to wait patiently before he receives the harvest.
- 3. Jesus is our ultimate example. As Jesus obeyed the will of the Father it brought suffering and death, but Jesus did not faint (give up).
 - Why is this? Because of the joy that was set before Him. Hebrews 12:2; cf. Hebrews 2:9-10
 - Hebrews 12:3 then admonishes, "For consider him that endured such contradiction of sinners against himself, lest ye be wearied and faint in your minds."

- 4. Christian, do not be weary, do not give up, do not allow Satan to convince you that God's Word is false. Remember verse 7 "*God is not mocked.*"
 - Keep sowing to the Spirit, keep walking in the Spirit, keep loving God, keep serving others and giving of yourself unselfishly.
 - In due season, the seeds you sow to the Spirit will return a bountiful and plenteous crop. The harvest will be fully brought in on judgment day and the reward will be yours to enjoy throughout eternity. 2 Corinthians 4:16-18
