•	When you write someone a card, or send them an email or text, you can take the time to

•	Encouraging your volunteers also includes walking with them through through the ups

•	Follow-up can be exhausting work because it requires you to become involved in the personal of those that you lead.

3. Use	Follow-Up to Concerns		
•	As leaders, we cannot get so busy finding new volunteers that we forget to check-up on our team members to make sure they are doing things the way they are supposed to be done.		
•	Paul understood this. While his ministry did often begin with messages to large crowds of people, it never ended there. He understood the importance of training and follow-up.		
•	Even after moving on to a new town, Paul would often write back to established churches to investigate concerns of sinful behavior or false teaching that had creeped in.
