Introduction:

1.	There are three principal characters in this story:		
	•	– who has a close partnership with Philemon. vs. 1	
	•	the offended head of Onesimus. vs. 11a	
	•	– the rebel and enemy of Philemon, who now has a relationship	
		with Paul. vs. 10	
2.	In this	letter, Paul plays the role of mediator between Philemon and Onesimus.	
3.	There	are some incredible spiritual truths that are put on display here in this little book.	
First	spirit	ual truth – the doctrine of mediation	
(Chris	st is th	e between me and God.)	
1.	Onesimus is a picture of every one of us before we found Christ. He was lost and without hope, in a completely alienated position.		
	•	"That at that time ye were without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth	
		of Israel, and strangers from the covenants of promise, having no hope, and	
		without God in the world." Ephesians 2:12	
	•	"And you, that were sometime alienated and enemies in your mind by wicked	
		works, yet now hath he reconciled." Colossians 1:21	
2.	A med	diator stepped in to help condemned Onesimus. Paul mediated with Philemon on	
	Onesi	mus' behalf.	
3.	We also were in a hopeless, alienated position from God Almighty, but a		
	stepped in to do for us what we could not do for ourselves.		
	•	"For there is one God, and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ	
		Jesus." 1 Timothy 2:5	

Second spiritual truth – the doctrine of imputation			
(Chr	ist takes my and gives me His righteousness.)		
1.	In verses 18 and 19, Paul says to Philemon, "Take his and all his wrong-doing and put that on my account. Credit me with the wrong he has done. Take my good standing that I have with you and put that on his account."		
2.	This is a beautiful picture of the doctrine of imputation.1 Peter 2:24; Romans 5:6-8		
	To impute simply means "to"		
	• "For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him." 2 Corinthians 5:21		
3.	Christ takes every one of our debts and has them imputed to Him. The		
	moment we trust Him as our Savior, He takes His righteousness and that		
	to our account.		
Thir	d spiritual truth – identification		
(God	d now receives me as He does His own)		
1.	In verse 17, Paul says, "If thou count me therefore a partner, receive him as myself."		
4.	Think about it. Christ does for us what Paul did for Onesimus. We were alienated from God by wicked works.		
5.	But Christ has a loving, eternal, partnership relationship with the Father. John 1:1, 14:9-10		
6.	When you trust Christ, Christ says, "Father, I have paid all their sin debts, I have given them my righteousness; now receive them just like you would"		
7.	When you got saved, you received an identification in Christ whereby you are completely accepted and received by the Father. Ephesians 1:6, 3:12		
	 "And because ye are sons, God hath sent forth the Spirit of his Son into your 		
	hearts, crying, Abba, Father. Wherefore thou art no more a servant, but a son;		
	and if a son, then an heir of God through Christ."
